Broughton House for Schools



Broughton House was the 18th century town house of the Murrays of Broughton and Cally, which was bought by E A Hornel, the renowned artist. Between 1901 and 1933 he added an art gallery, studio, and designed the fascinating garden with Japanese influences, which leads down to the estuary of the Dee. The House contains a major collection of Hornel's work, along with paintings by other artists and an extensive collection of Scottish books.

Education Programme

Broughton House is an important resource that offers cross-curricular learning opportunities for key areas of the 5-14 Curriculum.

A site visit offers:

- *Expressive Arts work*, especially individual projects at secondary level
- *a visit to the property* lasting up to 1_ hours, including a guided tour
